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At the time of this issue of the Newsletter, we have completed the first quarter of 2007. Spring arrived on the 20th day of March at 5:30 p.m.

Our attendance during this period of time has been outstanding. For the Month of January, 672 congregate meals were served and 96 home deliveries were made. In February, 620 congregate meals were served with 86 home deliveries. As of March 15th, there had been 395 congregate meals served and 63 home deliveries. This brings us to an overall total of 1,932 meals served in this quarter, with two weeks ahead in March.

Everyone seems to be very satisfied with the hot soup and salad/desert bar.

Our noon day meal each Tuesday and Thursday of the month is certainly a well balanced, nutritionally sound meal for the small donation price of \$3.00 for those 60 years or older and \$5.00 for those under 60.
