President's Report

<u>Leonard Johnson, President</u>

The business affairs of the Friendly Neighbors club are progressing fairly smoothly, thanks in no small part to the help of more experienced board members.

A fiscal budget has been adopted, nearly identical to our 2008 budget in total amount of anticipated income and expenditures, with some minor internal alterations in budget categories reflecting reporting requirements.

We have received donations of \$4,500 from the **Latah County Board of Supervisors**, and **\$500 from Tri-State Distributors**, for which we are most grateful.

Kay Keskinen has written a detailed outline of the duties and tasks required of our treasurer. It has been reviewed by me and others, and is on a path to completion.

When finished it will be very helpful. Also, a rough draft outlining the duties of the Meal Site Arrangements committee has been written, and is under review.

Our by-laws require that we have a Menu Review Committee, and steps are being initiated to revitalize that committee. It seems appropriate that our members, as users and beneficiaries of our meal site operation, should have an opportunity in a systematic and positive way to advise our kitchen staff regarding their menu preferences, their likes and dislikes, as our monthly menus are being composed. The principal purpose of the Menu Review Committee would be to provide a mechanism for achieving this. Any member who wishes to serve on this committee is invited to let me know.

I urge that all of us be alert to opportunities to invite friends and acquaintances that are not members of the Friendly Neighbors, and are 60 years of age or older, to consider joining us.

Have you read something recently that has changed the way you do things? I did, and I hope this will change you too.

I read an article that starts, "It turns out that "paper or plastic?" is a life or death decision for our environment." That got my attention!

Do plastic bags accompany you home every time you go shopping? It did for me. 500 billion plastic bags are given to shoppers each year. Most end up in a landfill, and they don't break down like you'd expect them to. What's this Hype About "Skype?"

Perhaps you've noticed on TV a visual that shows "Skype" when someone is appearing on TV remotely. Some news stations and "Oprah" use Skype to add people to their shows. Skype is a free computer program that allows people to connect via computers with a web camera (webcam). Connections between people who each use a Skype account are free; they can see each other via the webcam and talk using headphones or microphones and computer speakers.

Friendly Neighbors Finance\$

Friendly Neighbors Senior Citizens, Inc. is a non-profit corporation whose mission is to offer services and programs for senior citizens by serving nutritious meals (at the meal site or home delivered) and by providing the Moscow Senior Center as a social center for seniors.

As mentioned in the last newsletter, the Friendly Neighbors budget is tight. Our expenses increase each year. Every donation is important to keep our operations running. Again, the Latah County Commissioners are very generous in supporting us; without their funding we would operate in the red each year.

Tri-State also is very generous to community organizations, and this year they more than doubled their past year's contribution to Friendly Neighbors. Tri-State will be sponsoring five of our noon meals; the menus will indicate which meals Tri-State is sponsoring.

Friendly Neighbors was formed as non-profit organization in 1978, but many grants are only available to organizations with IRS 501(c)(3) charitable status. To increase opportunities for additional funding sources, Friendly Neighbors has recently filed an application with the IRS to receive 501(c)(3) status. The process is long (it can take more than six months) as well as expensive (the user fee for filing is \$750). We are hoping that the investment in the IRS status (assuming our application is accepted) will pay off with additional grants and more contributions by individuals and businesses; contributions would then become tax-deductible. We are accepting donations to help pay for the IRS user fee.

Thank you for your continued support of Friendly Neighbors and your membership in Friendly Neighbors. It is important for all of us to work together to continue to meet the needs of area senior citizens.

COFFEE FILTERS Not just for making Coffee....

- 1. Cover bowls or dishes when cooking in the microwave. Coffee filters make excellent covers.
- 2. Clean windows and mirrors. Coffee filters are lint-free so they'll leave windows sparkling.
- 3. Protect China. Separate your good dishes by putting a coffee filter between each dish.
- 4. Filter broken cork from wine. If you break the cork when opening a wine bottle, filter the wine through a coffee filter.
- 5. Protect a cast-iron skillet. Place a coffee filter in the skillet to absorb moisture and prevent rust.
- 6. Apply shoe polish. Ball up a lint-free coffee filter.
- 7. Recycle frying oil. After frying, strain oil through a sieve lined with a coffee filter.
- 8. Weigh chopped foods. Place chopped ingredients in a coffee filter on a kitchen scale.
- 9. Hold tacos. Coffee filters make convenient wrappers for messy foods.
- 10. Stop the soil from leaking out of a plant pot. Line a plant pot with a coffee filter to prevent the soil from going through the drainage holes.
- 11. Prevent a Popsicle from dripping. Poke one or two holes as needed in a coffee filter.
- 12. Do you think we used expensive strips to wax eyebrows? Use strips of coffee filters.
- 13. Put a few in a plate and put your fried bacon, French fries, chicken fingers, etc on them. This soaks out all the grease.
- 14. Keep in the bathroom. They make Great Razor Nick fixers.
